Dear Senators Stevens, Snowe, Inouye and Rockefeller:

We are writing to thank you for introducing S.241 and for working to include language in the Fiscal Year 2006 Commerce, Justice, Science Appropriations ("CJS") bill to extend the current Universal Service Fund exemption from the Antideficiency Act ("ADA") until December 31, 2006. Our diverse coalition greatly appreciates your leadership in working to unambiguously restore the Universal Service Fund's long-standing exemption from the ADA.

As you know, late last year staff at the Federal Communications Commission concluded that at least some Universal Service programs are subject to the Antideficiency Act, despite the fact that the decades old program was never previously subject to the ADA. This unofficial staff level decision threatened to raise phone rates, caused the Universal Service Administrative Company to lose millions in safe government backed securities and disrupted the E-rate program for nearly 6 months. The decision continues to cast a shadow over all Universal Service programs.

As a result of your efforts, Congress intervened this past December by explicitly - but temporarily - restoring the Universal Service Fund's prior standing outside the scope of the ADA. This short-term fix will expire on December 31, 2005, so we are grateful that the Senate acted in the CJS bill to extend the deadline for another year. We strongly support maintaining the CJS language in conference, but we also want to reiterate our support for helping you secure a permanent exemption.

Your leadership is critical to ensuring that this important investment in the nation's telecommunications infrastructure continues and we look forward to working with you to pass S.241, or the short term extension provided by the CJS bill, prior to the December 31, 2005 deadline.
